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#### **EPC Religious Education Examination Report** Paper (631/02)

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

The candidates who sat for 2022 EPC Religious education (631/02) were 27 706. The number of entries show a drastic decrease of candidature when comparing them with 2021 candidates who were 32 683.

The component had three sections worth 20 marks each. Candidates were expected to answer all questions. Each question consisted of structured questions which covered the three assessment domains:

- Knowledge and understanding
- Analysis and interpretation
- Evaluation

The overall candidate's performance for the year 2022 was on average. A majority of the candidates were able to score at least half of the total score in each section. This means that most candidates were able to access the questions. The highest was 55/60 while the lowest score was 0/60.

Another observation was that candidates struggled to interpret the demands of some questions. Among the domains, candidates tried to answer questions on knowledge and understanding. However, they had challenges in interpretation, analysis and evaluation questions e.g where candidates were expected to give character, the meaning of a parable, lesson learnt as well as supporting their opinion.

#### Points to note:

- 1. Answering in SiSwati was common
- 2. Incorrect spellings were witnessed
- 3. Grammatical errors
- **4.** Candidates also struggled with the following:
- (i) Reading a short passage and coming up with an answer
- (ii) Extracting a lesson from each story
- (iii) Drawing up a character of a person and symbolism

# **SUMMARY ON SPECIFIC DOMAINS**

# 1 Knowledge and understanding (AO1)

In all the three sections, candidates were able to score lots of marks. They were able to recall facts from each question. Nonetheless, they still had challenges in writing exact words taken from RSV Bible.

#### 2 Analysis and interpretation (AO2)

In this section, candidates tried to answer according to the demand of each question. They were able to come up with lesson learnt but had challenges in giving out characterization and symbolism.

#### 3 Evaluation (AO3)

The section requires a candidate to take a stand and support his or her opinion. Some did take a stand but minority struggled to support their opinion rather their reasons were not Biblically based or too general. For instance, no, pastors should not go and look for people who no longer come to church because pastor's wives gossip too much.
