INSTRUCTIONS TO CANDIDATES

1. The Prevocational Food and Textiles Technology Paper 3 consists of two school-based projects that are to be submitted to ECESWA by the 31st October.
2. From the given **task**, you are to undertake a school-based project which consists of an A4 size **portfolio** and **made product**.
3. The work must be original and submitted by yourself as an individual.
4. You are to **attempt both projects**, one from Food Technology and the other from Textiles Technology.
5. You are expected to generate a written proposal by 31st March.
6. You are allowed to consult with your teacher on the development of the project.
7. You are expected to cooperate with the external examiner who would be coming at certain intervals to assess the development stages of your project.
8. You are required to document evidence of the development stages of your project in the portfolio.
9. The portfolio should be availed to the external examiner on demand.
10. You are expected to present, explain and reflect on your work.
11. You are expected to write a report which will be outlining all the stages of development of the products. This report and the portfolio will be submitted to ECESWA by 31st October.

General information about the project is described in **Figure 1**. From this, you are to complete the various stages as described below.

The **Situation** of the project is described in Figures 1 and 2. The situation provides a basis for the problem statement of your project. You are expected to develop the problem statement further based on situations **(a)** and **(b)**.

(a) FOOD TECHNOLOGY**Project specification****Figure 1**

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(b) TEXTILES TECHNOLOGY**PROJECT TASK****SITUATION: PLANNING AND CONSTRUCTING A SCHOOL UNIFORM FOR A PRE-SCHOOLER.**

A preschool in your area has requested you to construct a school uniform (a shirt) for their students. Use embroidery stitches to embellish the patch pocket with the pre-school badge.

Select a suitable pattern and construct the pre-scholar uniform demonstrating a variety of textile skills.

To fulfill this task, you must complete a portfolio which contains the following:

1. A written proposal including a specification for this project of between 600 and 800 words.
2. Develop the product by planning and constructing school uniforms.
3. Evaluate the product regarding the specification.

You are to complete the stages as described below.

The **three** stages of the project are detailed as follows:

Stage 1: Proposal (15 marks)

- Written presentation (15 marks)

You will produce a proposal of between 600 and 800 words. The proposal will be submitted in hard copy by **31st** March. After approval of the proposal by your supervisor, you may continue with the project before submission of your proposal.

The proposal should include:

- Introduction – brief background and justification or purpose of the project
- Problem statement and justification - identification and justification of the need (gap) in the market
- Methodology - outlines the procedure (steps) to follow to complete the product.
- Time frame - anticipated completion dates for each stage of the project presented in a logical order.
- References - list of sources

Written Report

The written reports (Food and Textiles) shall be a description of the development stages of the product from stage 1 to stage 3. It should exhibit the appropriate technical terminology and the presentation depicting details of the projects in a well-articulated manner.

Report presentation format

Arial font, 12 pts, single spacing, pagination: bottom centre, margins: top and left margin 3 cm, bottom and right 2.54 cm, number of words: 2300 - 2800, reference style: American Psychological Association (APA).

Report submission mode

The report should be submitted as a hard copy booklet.

Stage 2 – Development stages (Product) worth 70 marks

- Preparation/Layout (15 marks)
- Implementation (40 marks)
- Product realisation (15 marks)

The investigation and development stage shall include details of the specifications and steps of the project development. The four main components of stage 2 are as follows:

- Preparations and layout will be included with the design of what is to be made, e.g. dishes or garments, with relevant information identified and collected.
- To include a wide range of different, appropriate solutions with a plan or specifications or details on the design of the artefact, e.g. recipes or patterns.
- Implementation deals with the application of appropriate methods (e.g. steps involved to come up with a two-course meal or processes involved in the construction of a uniform dress for a preschooler) for making the product. It also involves appropriate reasoned decisions about the processes involved.
- Product realisation - involves the completion of the development of the product which should be completed to a high standard and made with precision and accuracy. It should fully meet the requirements of the product specification.

Stage 3 - Evaluation of the project

- **Evaluation (15 marks)**

Evaluation of the product should include a reference to the specifications. This is a write-up of how the product was evaluated, whether it exhibits a high standard of accuracy or precision concerning the specifications. It details meaningful conclusions leading to proposals for further development.

Portfolio

The portfolio must include sufficient evidence, e.g. photographs, a write-up of the three stages of the project, planning sheets and any other relevant information to prove originality.

The portfolio must include the candidates' name, centre name and candidate's number for identification purposes.
